

Arizona Digital Government Summit 2010

Held May 18 – 19, 2010, this first-ever event was for and about digital government. The purpose of the event was (is) to foster discussion and dialogue on the use of information technology as a strategic tool for managers, executives and policy makers; to provide greater transparency and public access to government resources and; to reduce costs associated with printing, publishing and distributing government information.

The first annual Arizona Digital Government Summit offered many state and local government technology professionals an opportunity to connect with each other, to learn from experts and share ideas on how to improve services to our citizens. Attendance at the two day event was far higher than anticipated.

Current State Library Digital Projects include:

Persistent Digital Archives and Library System (PeDALS)

The Arizona State Library is building the capabilities to store and provide access to digital information in all forms, including public records and reports created by state and local governments, as well as personal papers, photographs, and other historical records. The materials may be born digital or may be digitized.

State Agency Website Archives

The Arizona State Agency Website Archives is composed of websites created by the state agencies of Arizona's government. The websites are collected on a bi-monthly basis using an automated web crawler operated by the Internet Archive's Archive-it service. This fully searchable collection contains website content from 2007 to present.

State Publications Collection in Arizona Memory Project

Digitized publications produced by and for Arizona state agencies are available from this online collection, which is updated on a continuing basis. Also included are a few reports that were not published for or by a state agency. These were received from the Legislature for inclusion in the collection.

A reading of the newspapers of this era will explain to Arizonans, as they plan for the state's centennial, why Arizona's inclusion in the Union took so long, the voices on either side of the debate and the complex process by which Statehood eventually occurred. Digitized newspapers from throughout the state will also provide information about other significant moments in Arizona history.
